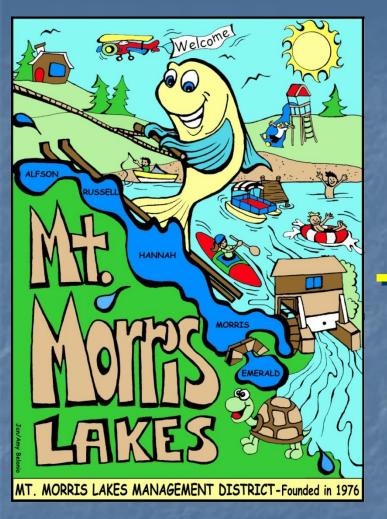

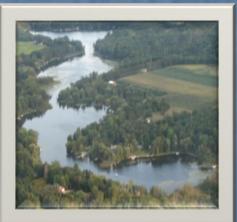

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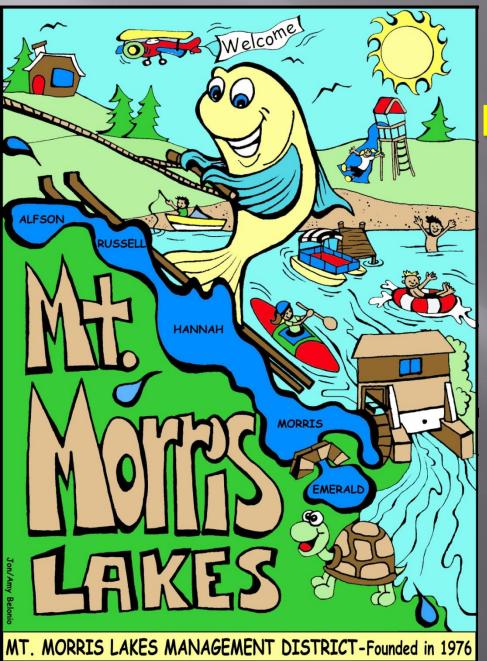

Breakfast Was Held From 8:00 Am To 9:00 Am Meeting Called To Order At 9:00am

Approved Meeting Agenda

- Introduction of Commissioners and District Membership
- Board of Commissioners introduced themselves
- Audience members introduced themselves: Approximately 40 attendance

Chairman's Comments: Tim Dahlstrand

- Thanked the work of the Board of Commissioner
- Explained the Zoom video conference that the Board conducted on May 9
- Explained what we learned at the Wisconsin Lakes Video conference for dealing with COVID-19
- Voting at District meetings had to be done in person, no video votes

Minutes from July 20, 2019 43rd Annual Meeting - Joe Slezak

- Minutes read and displayed by power point presentation
- Minutes were approved by the membership

DISTRICT BOARD REPORTS

2019-2020 Treasurer's Report – Peggy Thiel

- \$50,000 for annual assessment
- A DNR grant was approved. The \$13,326 of drawdown expense is to be covered by the grant at 75% or \$9,994.50
- The balance of the cost is to be covered by MMLMD.
- Bulk of expenses were for contracting labor for the harvester and parts and supplies
- We collected \$1,300 more than what we spent
- Treasurer's report audited and approved by SORENSON'S Tax Accounting Service
- Motion was made and seconded. Treasurer's Report was voted to be approved.

Endowment Fund Report – Bob Jozwowski

- Bob is the new Chairman since Paul Brinkman retired
- Overviewed the purpose for the fund and how one can contribute
- We peaked in 2019 and then slowed, but now recovering
- We have reached about 10% of our target (\$600,000)
- T-Shirts are being sold to supplement the fund
- Contributions from new people have flattened out.



Rob Adams: Update on AIS and process of a lake draw down

- Rob reviewed the two issues under consideration: AIS control and silt compression
- We spend about \$35-000 to \$45,000 a year for chemical treatment... winter draw down effectively controls AIS
- Our problem is mostly internal loading, (plants from our lake), not external loading (farm run-off).
- The mechanics and process of voting for winter and summer drawdown was discussed. A District-wide advisory referendum was discussed
- It was agreed that we will increase awareness and education about the draw downs and risks and benefits associated with them in combination with preparing a course of action for voting at the next annual meeting.



Presentation of 2020-2021 Budget – Peggy Thiel

- Cost \$64.000 or \$14,000 higher than last year
- Cost increases are due to upcoming special expenses: contract labor, a required state Dam inspection.
- Annual assessment will be held at the same level... but we will bring down our cash balance to do this.
- The 2020-2021 District Budget was voted for approval

Election of Commissioners

 Karen Tschurwald and Joe Slezak were approved by unanimous vote and Got with serving another 3 year term on the Board

Other topics for discussion were discussed:

 Investigate harvesting options and possible grants for buying harvesting equipment that clean up floating debris

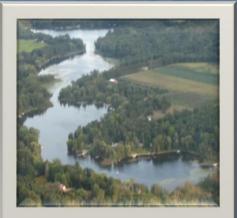

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Tim Dahlstrand



- The District Board of Commissioners met four times via Zoom teleconference (due to COVID meeting restrictions)...but the May meeting was in person.
- Thanks to our District Treasurer, Peggy Thiel, for preparing a rather difficult 2021-2022 financial report and District spending plan for this meeting.
- A membership mail-in ballot referendum has overwhelmingly approved the winter drawdown 2021-2022. We respect the opinion of our members, and we will vote later to certify this result. Much thanks goes to Rob Adams for coordinating the technical information placed on the website to understand the drawdown. Rob is our chief liaison with Onterra, our consultant.



- Thanks to the Friends of Mount Morris Lakes Endowment Fund for continued fund-raising efforts. Committee members are Clem Maslowski, Geoff Farrell, June Schroeder and Bob Jozwowski, the Committee Chairman.
- MMLMD publishes an annual newsletter to communicate with the membership. Our secretary, Joe Slezak, continues to be our writer and publisher and is commended for also handling the website, referendum vote, & managing harvesting operations.
- Karen Tschurwald is a new Board member this year and has been a great help in providing strategies for reaching out to our District members with ideas for better marketing & communications



- The Board has begun researching new harvesting equipment and future options. Preliminary findings will be presented at this meeting. The principal equipment operator is Cory Hedrick, and back-up operator and vegetation spreader is Jeff Williams.
- As required by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, a 10-year inspection was conducted by Becher-Hoppe Engineers on the dam and flume structures. Our dam needs maintenance attention but it is still in good shape.
- A few closing thoughts on welcoming new members to the lake, property development issues, lake behavior, combatting invasive species... and respect for one another as lake management and lake neighbors.

SOATING SEMAVOR ADVISORY: Low to moderate activity is momented for these lates. Use common sense: High performance personal waterceft measurers and highly unpredictable boating activity in crowded conditions (more than 7 boats) are not appropriate for safety measure. While a behavior might be "agel," it may not be a "sefe & appropriate" behavior for the boating conditions and limited space of these lates. Appreciate boating behaviors and large wakes cause harm to shore lines and theatens the sefety of boaten, cancer, paddle boarden, knysters, faherman, paddle boats, and swimmers.

WISCONSIN PERSONAL WATERCRAFT REGULATIONS Common Sense "Boating Behavior"

- No person may operate a PWC from sunset to sunrise
- Anyone under 12 may operate a PWC after completing training and attaining a boating training certificate.
- A PWC is prohibited from jumping the wake of another boat within 100 feet of that boat or another PWC
- There is no towing of persons engaged in water skiing, aquaplaning, or similar activities unless the PWC is designed to seat 3 people. There is no limit on number of skiers.

• Operation of a PWC within 100 feet of another boat or PWC is only allowed if the following requirements are met:

- Operation does not exceed slow-no-wake
- Neither boat is involved in any type of water skiing, tubing, or similar activity.

WISCONSIN WATERCRAFT REGULATIONS General Boating & Common Sense Behavior

- No boat or PWC towing a tuber or skier is allowed to operate FULL WAKE within 100 feet of any occupied anchored boat, PWC, marked swimming area, or public boat landing
- No one who is water skiing may get within 100 feet of another PWC or allow the tow rope to do so.
- No person may operate a personal watercraft faster than slowno-wake within 200' of shore on any lake in Wisconsin.
 Exceptions: Ski pickup or drop areas that are marked with regulatory markers

It is illegal to operate a PWC within 100 feet of the following:

- Another boat towing a skier
- The tow tope of another boat towing a skier /tuber
- A person who is skiing or tubing

WISCONSIN WATERCRAFT REGULATIONS Towing Watercraft Through Channels

 It is advisable that for safe practices on the water, boats or any other watercraft should not be towing tubes with occupants through the channels that lead to or from Mt. Morris Lake

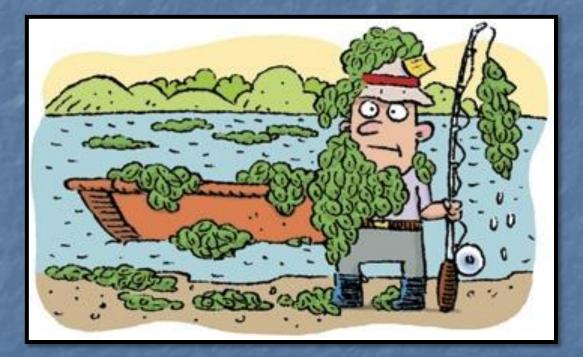
This is a matter of control of the object being towed.

 If an occupied tube is pulled by a line, there is no steering control if a gust of wind hits the tube, or if a wake pushes the tube into the path of an oncoming boat.

 Any watercraft or object that has to be towed through any lake or through any channel should do so at "SLOW-NO WAKE SPEED"

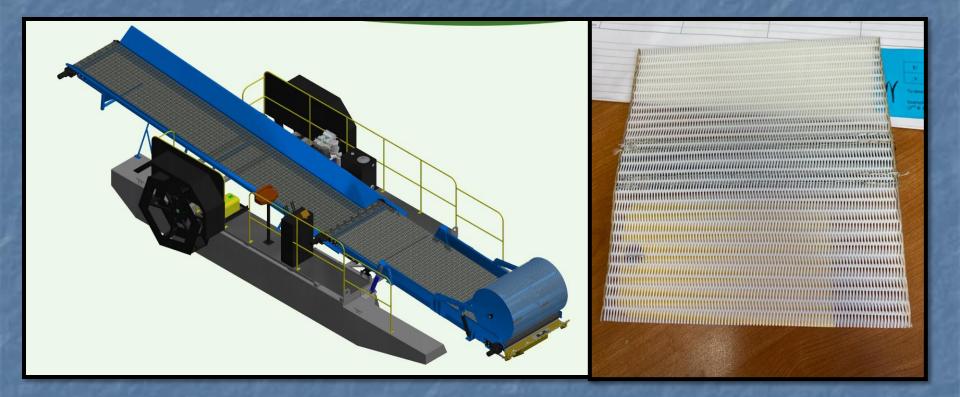

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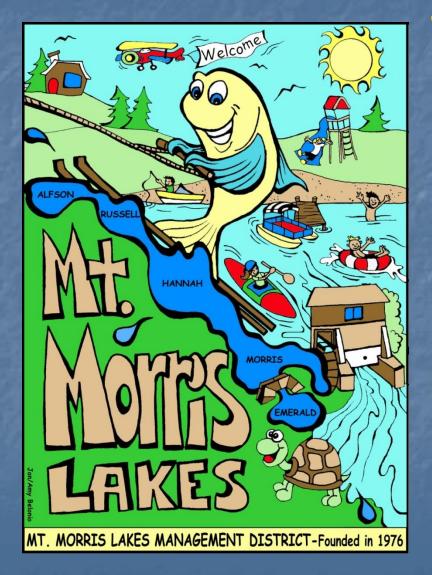
